PROFESSOR A. TOYNBEE ON CONSTANTINOPLE. INTERNATIONAL CONTROL OF THE STRAITS

Professor Arnold Toynbee, speaking at King's College, London, yesterday afternoon on the question of Constantinople, urged that the absolute security of the Straits under international control was a necessary preliminary to the post-war reconstruction of Eastern Europe and Russia. It was now British policy, he said, to open up trade as much as possible with Russia, and for this purpose it was necessary to have a free outlet through the Straits. This seaway would be still more important to the new countries which had arisen through the splitting up of Austria-Hungary, and the imminent solution of the Adriatic problem meant that the Danube would be the most convenient trade outlet, rather than the ports of Fiume and Trieste. Therefore, half Europe would depend on the Bosphorus for its economic revival. Even if in Constantinople the ancient city of Stamboul were left to the Turks, it was imperative, said Professor Toynbee, that the shores of the Bosphorus should be taken from them and handled over to the League of Nations.
